

The hub around which the wheel of the Fraternity turns is the shelter. Delta Tau Delta now has completed three years of comfortable living in the finest and most modern fraternity house at Iowa State College.


The recently completed structure has been the talk of the campus since construction started in June of 1953. Accommodations for 42 men have been provided in the two-story brick and metal building.

Arizona Sandstone covers the front of the lower story. The blending pinks and browns of this stone offer a striking contrast to the huge Indiana Limestone letters which produce a vertical Delta Tau Delta to greet the visitor as he approaches the front door. Stained redwood is used for the cornice and porch ceiling. The porch floor is laid with crab orchard flagstone. In back of the shelter, limestone is used in a retaining wall which encloses an 1800 square foot patio space which is accessible from the dining room. A 66 x 100 foot parking lot is another feature of the new shelter.

Along with the modern exterior features are the latest interior attractions.

Fifteen 2-man rooms, 3 three-man rooms, the 2 dormitories, and lavatory, and 2 storage closets are contained in the second story plan. Each study room has its own wardrobe complete with sliding steel doors.

The rooms are heated by finned-tubed heating elements located in the outer walls of the rooms. Acoustical tiling is used on all downstairs ceilings. The lavatory has ceramic tile walls and a mosaic tile floor.

The lavatory provides ample shower and toilet facilities. Two dormitories afford a choice for the hot or cold sleeper. One dorm is heated, the other not. Adequate outlets for electric blankets are provided in both dorm with no chance of blowing a fuse in the circuit-breaker electrical system. Two phone booths upstairs and one downstairs help make getting last-minute dates easier. A roof ventilator is used to freshen the air in all rooms.
